I know that you bury that you didn't F
01:08
to assess we're not talking about you
01:09
obviously do you feel that like in that
01:12
such situation where someone has made it
01:14
fairly clear their intentions and then

some other party has kind of done the
01:17
opposite of that do you feel there is
01:18
such a thing as kind of bad vibes
01:20
associated with that year or not
01:21
necessarily it's just a shame that that
01:23
person's intentions were respected I
01:26
think it's kind of a shame I mean I
01:28
think it applies in different ways like
01:30
I think for Indiana it's a special kind
01:33
of thing because he's kind of like a
01:35
deep grandfather of a lot of people like
01:38
he's an old-timer and he was a big seed
01:40
collector and he has a lot of amazing
01:42
stuff and he's very altruistic and he's
01:44
in giving and he gives he'll give you
01:46
know the most rare seeds effort to like
01:49
some new guy that you know maybe that
01:51
just started like he he's he's kind of
01:53
like this unique Santa Claus and I think
01:55
for someone that does that I mean I've
01:57
heard him get in trouble too of giving
01:59
out stuff that he's not supposed to but
02:01
he for him I think you know with elders
02:04
especially I think we should kind of
02:06
respect that and his whole thing was he

02:07
wanted that strain to be kind of like he
02:10
wanted to be free he wanted people to
02:12
enjoy
02:12
and you want to do it in this big thing
02:14
was yeah you can make hybrids but you
02:16
can't but you can't f2 it for money so
02:18
I'm pretty sure you can give it away but
02:22
you know talk to him for a while but
02:24
there does seem to be a lot of those
02:25
kind of strange cuts and it's mostly
02:28
people just kind of I understand if
02:30
they're really rare and if people spend
02:32
a tremendous amount of time or it's
02:34
enough or it's it's a family strain that
02:37
goes back generations but I think that's
02:40
where communication comes in if you know
02:42
if people are open and they communicate
02:44
about what they want to do what things
02:46
are there doesn't need to be bad blood
02:48
or things and it's sad when a string
02:50
gets that kind of energetic kind of gunk
02:54
on it because it holds that you know
02:56
just like every seed is kind of a prayer
02:59
that's just waiting to be popped open
03:01
and through epigenetics it holds not

03:03
only its history going back through time
03:05
but all the cultures that you don't
03:06
realize it like a seed is this I mean
03:09
people don't realize how amazing it is
03:11
it's this kind of dusky jewel that that
03:13
that transforms time into you know into
03:17
a tangible way to interact with it so
03:19
yeah it's it's basically like a
03:21
bejeweled time machine that holds
03:23
everything so I think you know these
03:25
seeds and clones and everything are very
03:27
sick and very special and they don't
03:29
need to have this thing around and I you
03:31
know there are instances where like I
03:32
said with families I'll hold that but I
03:34
don't know it's tricky I think it comes
03:36
down to really to communication and if
03:38
people have something that you want them
03:40
that you want to keep to yourself you
03:43
probably shouldn't give it out because
03:44
things get out you know people are human
03:46
and it's like if you give it out it's
03:48
probably gonna get out and it's it's you
03:52
know I don't know I understand it from
03:54
all different things all different

03:56
viewpoints but really it's a joke comes
03:58
down to communication I think and that's
04:00
where it's gonna happen you know yeah
04:04
sure so are there any cuts which you
04:07
don't like to work with from maybe say
04:09
the kind of the more modern elite clones
04:11
maybe not necessarily due to what we
04:14
were just talking about but maybe just
04:15
in general you don't particularly like
04:16
working with them are there any you know
04:18
kind of popular modern elite clones that
04:20
fall into that category for you you know
04:23
I veer away from work of
04:26
and breeders that I don't jive with I
04:28
would step back to everybody but at some
04:30
time I won't usually breed with clones
04:32
from someone that I are lies on jive
04:36
with so much and four clones you know
04:40
and I don't know if there's a lie if
04:43
it's a really like if it has a lot of
04:45
drama around it I kind of stay away with
04:48
it from unless unless I know who it came
04:50
from and I can kind of communicate with
04:52
them like gg4 like you know I know
04:55
either I can communicate and I could

04:58
offer up what I what I want to do and
05:00
they could respect that and I could
05:02
respect them and that could happen like
05:04
you know and people that have special
05:08
things like if there's a communication
05:10
there I think it's okay and but there
05:12
are a lot of clones that just get out
05:14
into the wild and people go with it and
05:15
if people get uptight and no no it's
05:18
it's none of those kind of communication
05:20
things it's such a strange thing I wish
05:21
people would kind of stop chasing these
05:24
clones and really just start popping
05:25
their seat collections you know and also
05:27
you know I could see kind of like a new
05:29
interesting trend it's like before I
05:31
would just be these amazing clones that
05:33
people would have that pop up like the
05:34
cams and the ojiisan now but now you're
05:36
seeing people that have that have kind
05:38
of like a good vibe and a good internet
05:39
presence like a picture later or skunk
05:43
master flex you'll have like the GMO
05:45
cookies and caps got the Mac and just
05:48
from their good vibes and them hyping it

05:50
on their up their strain that they
05:52
really like that they've created they've
05:53
kind of created their own elites and I
05:55
think so not we're not just finding me
05:58
more we're kind of creating them and I
06:00
think that I was gonna show people that
06:01
anyone can find these special elites and
06:04
then hey if people have a problem it's
06:06
like then you have a your own special
06:08
elite you guys can trade it's like I
06:09
think people should stop chasing and
06:12
start creating you know I think people
06:13
we have so much to uncover that it's
06:17
kind of we don't want to just be chasing
06:19
our tails anymore even though it's fun
06:20
and the strains are pretty cool these
06:23
days but I think there's a lot more to
06:25
really explore so with that in mind how
06:29
important do you feel it is that new
06:31
seeds are constantly being popped
06:33
because for example in Australia
06:36
I find people aren't don't really pop
06:38
that many seeds so to speak at least on
06:40
average and I try to tell them in my
06:42
opinion at least it seems like that's

06:43
what drives the progression of the scene
06:45
in a way you know like the new things
06:47
coming out that people can enjoy you
06:49
know how do you feel about that and does
06:50
that play into your philosophy of making
06:53
everyone's because it's almost a way of
06:54
facilitating that yeah I mean in
06:57
California it's kind of different is
06:58
there's a clone culture and it's kind of
07:01
changing now especially without doing
07:02
people realizing that seeds are just so
07:05
much more vibrant in the root system is
07:07
so much more amazing and they don't have
07:09
all the STDs that all the clones do but
07:13
you know California is it is a clone
07:15
culture and it's a hype culture it's
07:16
driven by music is driven by coolness is
07:19
driven by you know thing you know you
07:21
know even if a strain maybe isn't the
07:23
ultimate strain if you get rappers
07:25
smoking and rapping about it you know
07:27
cookies a good example cookies amazing
07:29
strain it's really cool but there's a
07:31
lot of drama around there's a lot of
07:33
people saying you know this and that and

07:35
it makes cool hybrids it's neat but it's
07:38
people are you know it takes for people
07:40
just people will latch onto something
07:42
and just take it you know just hammer it
07:45
to the ground and it's it's like kind of
07:46
sad for the strain itself it's like I
07:48
would love to see people popping seeds
07:51
and I think it's happening more and I
07:53
think people are getting more into it I
07:55
just worry about the future and the way
07:57
things are going you know maybe
07:59
eventually mr. Khanna's because really
08:02
cheaper and there's lots of brands and
08:04
there's lots of people pumping it out
08:05
that people won't really have the
08:08
impetus to pop seeds maybe people just
08:11
do it ornamentally or just for crafts
08:13
but I really think that yeah everything
08:16
comes from a seed and it all of our best
08:18
stuff is always that's just where it
08:20
comes from I mean that's its origin
08:22
that's where you're gonna find it and
08:23
that's where we should be looking yes I
08:26
mean if we kind of tap into the mindset
08:28
of the people who are kind of promoting

08:31
that clone community at least
08:33
subconsciously a lot of what I hear from
08:35
these types of folk is that you know the
08:37
the elite clones are just so far
08:39
superior to you know most things you'd
08:41
get out of seeds that storm is not worth
08:44
bothering with seeds with that in mind
08:46
do you find there's a big variation
08:48
between the elite
08:49
like do you find that there are some
08:50
cuts that definitely consider delete you
08:52
know they're just phenomenal in every
08:54
way then there are others which may be
08:55
considered elite by the masses but they
08:57
just really kind of don't stand up
08:59
compared to the other one for example
09:01
yeah I think too there's also sometimes
09:04
in the clone world you get a lot of
09:06
different clones like I'm sure they're
09:07
you know there's at least two blue dream
09:09
clones there's a really good blue dream
09:10
clone that I love I think where dreams
09:12
also by Blue Gene gets a lot of flack
09:13
and I think it's because people grow the
09:15
really bland quicker more indica version

09:17
of blue dream and I don't know I think
09:20
there's clones that are at least because
09:22
they have a history they've performed
09:24
for you know 10 20 years and they have a
09:27
really special uniqueness to them and
09:29
they always kind of hit home just where
09:32
you want them and then there's a lot of
09:33
the especially in the new hyper Turkey
09:37
kind of I call it kind of a pop art
09:40
breeding kind of like derivative
09:42
breeding where it's people are
09:45
everybody's kind of everything's
09:46
derivative of itself and people are
09:48
smashing everything together and it's
09:49
kind of that Andy Warhol style breeding
09:52
where it's very neon it's very flashy
09:54
it's bright it's loud you're really
09:56
hitting all the boxes with flavor and
09:58
smell and it's more for the kind of like
10:01
recreational kind of dab culture that
10:03
loves the more they love the enjoyment
10:05
of the flavors and tastes more than
10:08
maybe so the effects or the the origins
10:11
and so you know it's it kind of comes
10:17
down to it it's like if I'm an elite

10:19
spin on leap for more than five years I
10:22
think it you know like oh gee no one's
10:24
gonna dispute that that's not an awesome
10:26
plan Kim Kim as no one's gonna dispute
10:29
that but there's new stuff that comes
10:30
online and people chase everyday that
10:32
you know that and it's hard for me I
10:33
like to I find it fascinating and I'd
10:35
love to try all these new things and I
10:36
trying to keep abreast you know like all
10:39
the new stuff like the purple punches
10:40
and the Sunday drivers and the orange
10:43
trees and the lemons this and then I
10:46
love checking all those out and I loved
10:48
seeing that but you know a lot of times
10:50
those don't last more than a year or two
10:52
you know then 16 with cookies cookies is
10:55
a great well it's it's held itself up
10:57
and you know people love it and it's
10:59
probably last in the test of time but
11:01
there's a lot of derivatives kind of
11:03
one offs that pop in enough kind of like
11:05
bubbles they probably surface people get
11:06
really into it and when enough people
11:08
try it they're kind huh so I think it's

11:12
more elites it's what what passes the
11:14
test of time you know and so do you ever
11:19
have any intentions of ever delving back
11:21
into some of the really old-school stock
11:24
like you know SSS say for example we've
11:27
got the temple you know a good example
11:29
of where you've done that would you ever
11:32
be interested in doing it more and if
11:34
not is that because you know the future
11:37
excites you so much
11:38
oh no I love vintage lines and that's
11:41
kind of my one of my things for
11:43
Supernatural selections is like I really
11:44
get to get deeper into those and I
11:46
actually have a lot of stuff going on
11:47
right now that you know some of my old
11:49
stuff of like beaches choice and NL too
11:52
and you know like all these really
11:54
unique old vintage ones I have on you
11:58
know from older seed companies I have I
12:00
have a really nice friend who was
12:02
instrumental in some of the early Nevel
12:06
working since you work he and he sends
12:08
me some really cool stuff and I love
12:10
getting stuff from him and sometimes

12:11
it's old junk and it turns out funny but
12:13
I just love seeing it because it's like
12:15
a snapshot to a snapshot to a bygone era
12:17
you know it's like you really get to see
12:18
and it's neat to see what people
12:21
remember and then what they're really
12:23
the reality is you know because you know
12:26
over time people granule eyes their
12:28
memories and they change and but I love
12:31
vintage stuff it's one of my favorite
12:33
things to pop and then whenever I can I
12:35
do you know if and I have a quite a good
12:36
collection of vintage seeds but I can
12:39
only do so much and since I do kind of
12:41
have to work on a couple different
12:43
levels I kind of have to partition
12:44
myself so let's say like 50 percent goes
12:47
to Bodhi seeds and then 10 percent goes
12:49
to vintage and 10 15 percent goes to
12:51
Norika and now I think maybe like 30
12:54
percent will go to supernatural
12:57
selections so I just I have to find that
12:59
kind of pie chart that makes everything
13:01
move forward so I can pay the rent and
13:03
also explore everything I can and also

13:05
you know follow my own passion and also
13:08
create things so people can follow their
13:10
own passion but yeah I would love to see
13:12
more vintage stuff come out and I I
13:13
really get excited and I love
13:15
stuff that Mean Gene pulls out of his
13:17
hat well he has a lot of cool vintage
13:18
stuff and yeah people are just popping
13:21
on the woodwork with all these unique
13:22
lines I'm like whoa that still exists
13:24
you know it's like wow someone has that
13:26
it's I'm excited about vintage lines
13:30
yeah I mean speaking on one specifically
13:33
talked of Kabul has always been one
13:35
that's being quite interesting to me and
13:37
I think it's probably because of the
13:38
elusive any of it so to speak
13:40
what was that strain like and do you
13:41
ever plan to use it again or have you
13:43
maybe lost it you know I like talkable I
13:47
like all those rough although Afghan
13:49
ease their their little you know it
13:52
depends on what you're getting there a
13:53
little bit blend the talking football
13:54
was unique in that you know it's from

13:56
Marx Castle mark is like he's an amazing
13:59
old character guy I think he kind of
14:01
hyped it up a little bit cuz I don't
14:03
from what I don't totally agree with
14:05
what he said about it maybe I didn't
14:07
grow it to its full potential or even
14:10
outdoors but to me it's a really nice
14:12
commercial eff like modern and Afghani
14:16
like it's kind of that bland but dark
14:19
it's got the raw power of Afghani it's
14:22
got good good strength but as a breeding
14:25
plant its kind of bland and kind of blah
14:28
in a way but for where it is you know I
14:31
I'm not growing it in the arid high
14:34
desert of Afghanistan and I'm not really
14:36
making I'm sure making hash with it is
14:40
phenomenal and that's kind of what I use
14:41
it in is one of my deep line I'll coming
14:45
crosses which is kind of focusing on the
14:48
kind of like traditional plants that
14:50
were used for hash making and kind of
14:52
hybridizing those with the g13 hash plan
14:54
or other indicas and it's it's a cool
14:57
plan it's also he also had another one
14:59
called warlord that came from the same

15:01
thing in the whole deal with that was I
15:02
guess there was a was in like 2002 or 96
15:07
one of it was way back when somewhere
15:08
the Special Forces went in rated of
15:11
warlord and there was growing a lot of
15:15
really amazing cannabis for hash and it
15:18
was the big talk in Kabul everybody
15:20
loved that hash and the Special Forces
15:22
went in and raided it and someone
15:23
grabbed the seeds and brought them back
15:25
from that
15:26
so it was one of those cool kind of like
15:27
all those old it really cool Afghani to
15:29
have that backstory kind of like a link
15:30
technology has its backstory and you
15:33
know everyone I like those old kind of
15:35
things and they actually if we're
15:37
talking about crazy old Afghani style
15:41
stuff straight Fox got some seeds from I
15:45
think it's from his brother who served
15:47
over in Iraq in Rania and those seeds
15:50
are amazing like it is like a dead
15:52
ringer for like if you could take pure
15:55
Kush and cookies and put them together
15:56
like this

15:57
spicy bread II like Persian bakery smell
16:02
and like it's really beautiful heavy
16:03
body like it reminds me kind of like the
16:06
Hollywood pure cush the one or the LA
16:08
pure Krishnaji like one but the more
16:10
like feminine cushy kind of baby power
16:14
ask one like there's some amazing yeah
16:19
kind of like the LA pure but kind of
16:22
more in the kind of the bubble realm but
16:24
with but yeah there's some of those old
16:27
Afghan ease are amazing and that's kind
16:28
of what I'm excited this year I'm doing
16:30
a lot of really old weird Afghan ease
16:31
outside I'm doing like my artifact one
16:34
which is kind of like the Afghani that
16:36
everybody remembers but no one's been
16:38
able to procure like that super accurate
16:40
almost roadkill like cabbagey kind of
16:43
like a deep chunky but not as bland as
16:45
deep chunk kind of this really raw kind
16:48
of like I don't know it smells like a
16:50
prison basketball game or something I
16:53
don't know but you know I just like
16:54
exploring all the weirdest things but
16:56
yeah the taco cabal cool line cool

16:59
breeder but on its own I don't think
17:01
that the best it's interesting because
17:04
you just touched on about four or five
17:06
questions which we'll get to soon enough
17:08
first question though I'm a huge deep
17:10
chunk fan I'm a huge Tom Hill thinner I
17:12
love all of his work even mentioned
17:14
about this at the Emerald cup I've never
17:16
found a deep chunk which I was satisfied
17:19
with the flavor kind of like how you
17:21
describe the talk of Kabul it was always
17:22
a bit lackluster in my opinion did you
17:25
have you found the same like I mean I've
17:26
found good use for it as a breeding tool
17:28
because you know there's still a lot of
17:29
desirable characteristics around it but
17:31
you know have you ever found a female
17:33
where you were like damn you know this
17:34
has got a good taste as well as all
17:36
those other deep chunk traits you know
17:39
long time ago I found one deep chunk and
17:41
I was like I call it like the sativa
17:43
Fein arson by which it's not of course
17:44
it was just a little bit more stretchy
17:46
and a little bit more flavorful and it

17:48
was kind of a seemed like a throwback
17:49
that's the only other one I mean other
17:51
than that they all they're so in bred
17:54
and they're so you know I mean that
17:56
plant is like full-on dinosaur Jurassic
17:59
Park like it must have been inbred
18:00
through some families in Afghanistan for
18:03
hundreds of years like it is like
18:06
basically it's also the ultimate like
18:08
fun learning Afghani to breed with that
18:10
was my first Afghani that I really got
18:12
into and kind of bread with and even I
18:14
did some of my early lines I wore deep
18:15
crosses it turns everything into Z chunk
18:18
which is amazing but you get just like
18:20
you know what I mean it just it is like
18:22
terminator of plants and it has a really
18:25
cool effect like my sister really those
18:27
deep chunk like just makes her laugh and
18:29
it makes her feel good it has a really
18:30
it has that classic just take you home
18:34
Huggy kind of vibe I mean it doesn't
18:37
always behave indoors like you know all
18:39
the Tom stuff is more for outdoors
18:41
anyways and that's where I was bred but

18:43
deep chunk you know it's like if we were
18:45
teaching a course like it's the textbook
18:48
Afghan like you can't get any more like
18:51
textbook Afghan even like like that's
18:53
kind of like if you ever saw that
18:53
picture of Richard Evan Schall T's and
18:55
wherever he wasn't Afghanistan he's
18:56
standing by those really squat old
18:59
plants I think I was in the 40s like it
19:01
looks that basically looks like deep
19:02
chunk and that I think deep chunk is
19:04
it's pretty cool even though I don't
19:06
really enjoy breeding with it because it
19:08
just turns everything in deep trunk now
19:11
ever found that myself a lot I found one
19:13
male where kind of isn't so dominant
19:17
like it turns everything phenotypically
19:19
into deep chunk but I found this one now
19:21
where a lot of the mothers kind of the
19:23
high and the taste seems to shine
19:24
through so I'm enjoying playing with
19:26
that but like Jesus that flavor has got
19:27
some serious issues with it like but on
19:31
another little interesting side note I
19:33
found a female that had just this

19:35
amazing highest where it must have had a
19:37
really significant percentage CBD in it
19:39
but I called it the face melter cuz it
19:41
was great you know it was like having um
19:43
I mean like a warm water port over your
19:45
face it was awesome like a massage yeah
19:48
I missed those like yeah like a body
19:50
massage bud
19:51
yeah so I mean just dipping back on a
19:55
thing you mentioned a few questions ago
19:57
do you think there is you know a certain
20:00
amount of romanticism around strains
20:03
from years gone by I mean the typical
20:04
ones being you know haze ty roadkill
20:09
skunk that's a great one you know I've
20:10
never experienced the roadkill skunk
20:11
myself so I'm still a bit on the fence
20:13
especially because a lot of the people
20:14
who I I really trust their opinions they
20:16
speak so highly of it but I mean I hear
20:18
stories about you know people will say
20:20
like oh you know you'd smell it in a
20:21
guy's pocket before it even walked in
20:23
the house and it's like is that really
20:25
true like I've never had anything close

20:27
to that happen to me with modern
20:29
cannabis was it really that strong uh
20:32
you know I I think there was a lot of
20:34
really special old strains back there
20:36
and I think you know what they always
20:37
say is like if you remember the 60s you
20:40
weren't there kind of thing I think
20:41
there's a lot of there's a lot of old
20:43
stoners that have a lot of fond memories
20:44
of their youth and they kind of believe
20:46
in things but there was some strains
20:48
that really stood out and especially I
20:50
think a lot of the import from these
20:51
point of origin places where they had
20:53
all the terroir and they had all that
20:55
and they brought it through those things
20:56
would really they would really ring some
20:58
bells and you know the roadkill
21:00
strengthening I mean that's it that's
21:03
something that I've been kind of playing
21:04
with for years and I can't get it right
21:07
like I've done so many different hybrids
21:10
and so many out crosses and I can get
21:12
like it get almost right but then it it
21:15
won't cure out skunky or you know or

21:18
it'll be too pissy or it won't be strong
21:20
enough like you know it's there and I
21:23
really think that with the roadkill
21:26
stunk yeah I think it was probably a
21:29
really hideous old Afghani one of those
21:32
Afghani that was bred forever to be
21:34
super super strong for their hash and I
21:37
think it really kicked people's ass but
21:38
you know it also got people busted and I
21:41
also think that that terpene I think it
21:43
must have some kind of a lower molecular
21:45
weight or something because I think it
21:47
vaporizes pretty quick because outside
21:49
it'll smell for blocks like people so
21:52
you know of course people are getting it
21:53
busted like you can't miss it it's my
21:54
the whole neighborhood smells like a
21:56
dead skin but on the line for two weeks
21:59
it'll smell like that but week three all
22:01
of a sudden the terpenes vaporize are
22:03
they something a torch
22:05
and it doesn't it doesn't hold so I
22:09
don't know I know you know people
22:10
reminisce about that light green golf
22:13
ball super killing you smell through

22:15
your pocket and those strains do exist
22:17
but I don't know I mean I'm hoping to
22:21
have something close by the end of the
22:24
summer but you know I'm not on time I
22:26
don't like here I'm just more of a fun
22:28
thing but it's it's difficult you know
22:30
but cannabis puts out every imaginable
22:33
smell you can think of it somehow you
22:35
can get it to create that from onions to
22:37
passionflower to like fruit loops it's
22:41
there and you can bring it out and I
22:43
think it's just I think really it's a
22:45
combination of maybe some kind of
22:47
Colombian Afghani or maybe even like a
22:50
some kind of really oil cannae like
22:53
motor oil kind of Afghani sativa mixed
22:57
with a with the kind of some kind of
23:01
grueling acrid low low I don't know it's
23:04
it's there I think people can find it
23:06
and I think people will and I think
23:07
people whether they created or someone
23:09
digs it out of their trunk I think it's
23:11
still out there I think it's just it
23:14
just was kind of selected against in in
23:16
the 80s and 90s and you know mid 90s is

23:19
when all the fruity stuff came in all
23:21
the bubble gums and blueberries and all
23:23
that funny gross stuff it kind of went
23:25
by the wayside everybody wanted the kind
23:27
of you know all the groovy fruity bubbly
23:31
stuff and that even put the nail and
23:33
coffin even deeper for it so what's your
23:37
favorite flavor of cannabis I don't know
23:39
you know I I really like effects but if
23:42
I had to have a flavor you know I do

made us he's like shamrock shakes where
94:03
she just blended it in water and that
94:06
was and you know we drank those and
94:09
since you don't really it gets destroyed
94:11
in your gut we got these really light
94:14
effects from it and it was so beautiful

and so feminine so special but it didn't
94:18
really hit us and it always kind of had

a special part so when it became kind of

a thing and people started smoking it I

especially up in the Andes like oh my

oh yes
99:36
takes me back to being a young boy doing
99:38
the old acid-base extraction that's that
99:43
it's a bit of a sad story actually
99:44
because you there's certain parts of
99:46
Australia where it grows really well and
99:48
you go there and the trees have just
99:50
been absolutely stripped of all their
99:51
bark and yeah they're really struggling
99:54
because if people just go on to town on
99:56
it oh my gosh I know now that's a big
99:59
choco craze everybody wants it to make
100:01
their chaga and yeah it's a strange
100:04
thing I wish people got more into flares
100:05
but I guess it's just not a viable plant
100:09
for extraction you know what's
100:12
interesting is it's kind of maybe a
100:14
little peripheral but it was actually in
100:17
that extraction of the DMT from the
100:20
acacia probably about eight or nine
100:22
years ago now when I first learned about
100:24
it they were doing dewaxing you know
100:26
like you're removing the lipids from the
100:28
concentrates back then but they
100:30
certainly haven't started doing that

100:31
until much more recently with cannabis I
100:33
think that's kind of interesting how
100:34
they were like ahead of the curve in
100:36
that respect at least yeah as well I
100:38
mean that kind of just goes back into
100:40
your basic crime biochemistry I think
100:41
with us donors we don't really we never
100:43
really had that science background you
100:46
know and it seems like when you're
100:48
actually doing scientific extraction
100:53
you're kind of have to involve those
100:55
principles so I think it's donors we
100:56
just never got it but yeah that's true
100:58
they were dewaxing and then there was
100:59
that kind of like that rough extract it
101:01
was like the jungle spice that had that
101:03
kind of yellow wax and they found that
101:05
something actually constituents in it so
101:08
they're kind of pulling out some of the

good stuff yeah I actually only ever

really came across the yellow stuff
101:14
myself at least when I didn't make it

but um yeah it's certainly an

interesting one too if you were to look

ayahuasca analogue you know like a

Syrian room mushroom mixture or you know

the most hostile is Syrian rule

so many ways to kind of emulate or even
101:49
with research chemicals now they're
101:51
emulating like ayahuasca type compounds
101:53
and they even think some of the the most
101:55
ancient some soma compounds were like
101:58
were different in beta Hart karma
102:03
beta-carbolines and like DMT sources I
102:06
mean it's such an ancient alchemical
102:08
science but yeah I think you would enjoy
102:10
ayahuasca but I would say maybe do it in
102:12
its natural environment maybe get down
102:14
into the jungles and really or that or
102:18
do it in someplace that that is in

102:19
nature yeah I've heard that above all of
102:23
other things you know like sentence
102:24
setting is the most important thing with
102:26
ayahuasca because for a lot of reasons
102:29
but it is very much a ritual it's no I
102:30
don't think there's many people who
102:32
would say that it's purely recreational
102:33
oh yeah it's not recreational at all
102:36
it's very it's very hard on your system
102:38
I mean you're you're you're vomiting a
102:39
lot I mean that's kind of what I did my
102:42
research thesis on ayahuasca shamanism
102:44
and the Amazon when when I was in the
102:46
university so it's like I had to do some
102:49
grueling stuff and it's yeah it's I
102:51
always tell people it's like you know
102:53
now we have a lot of this well if you do
102:55
yoga and if you go to festivals yeah you
102:57
gotta try how I wast gets become like
102:59
the it's kind of a like like cool person
103:02
rite of passage if you're like hip but
103:05
really you know the key to ayahuasca is
103:07
like it's there to eat you're either
103:09
there to be healed learn to be a healer
103:12
I think those are really the only two

103:15
things that people should be using for
103:16
it is if you're learning to be a healer
103:18
in Iowa's Cairo or if you're there to be
103:20
healed I mean I always tell people they
103:21
should take like an interview with it
103:23
like a first everybody should interview
103:25
with it like you at least do it once and
103:28
so that it can impart its knowledge and
103:30
kind of check you out and you can check
103:32
it out but I don't it's not a
103:33
recreational thing but I think it's
103:35
something kind of like Burning Man you
103:37
should always you know you should you
103:39
should do it once
103:40
kind of like a Eclipse you should see a
103:41
total solar eclipse there's things in
103:43
life that I think everybody should try
103:44
and yeah probably one of them so my
103:49
question I'm really interested to ask is
103:51
out of all the countries you've been to
103:52
which one is left the most positive you
103:55
know kind of impact on you you know but
103:57
in terms of both you know things you're
104:00
doing in the country we're going to

so whether that be good stuff there or

whether you're able to good sense good

stuff back or just you know like a

combination of that as well as you know

like just you enjoy the place nice

village about five hours each village is
